Armed Forces Parade: the heroes march past

For the first great event, thousands of spectators watched the men and women of the Army, Navy and Air Force pay tribute to our history, wearing uniforms and carrying equipment from different periods of Colombia's existence. This included everything from the peasant soldiers of the early days to the highly-specialized and well-trained cadres of today.

The marching troops and policemen were joined by a fleet of vehicles and a flypast of helicopters and fighters, whose speed easily outstripped that of the photographers!

On the route Avenida 68, The loudest cheers, shouts of "Thanks" and "Heroes" came to Libertad I, the helicopter used in the Plan Jaque, the operation that rescued distinguished hostages from the guerrillas; the parade of soldiers wounded in combat, the "Men of Steel" from the Army and the show of antique police cars.

The Bogota Symphony Orchestra and the famous salsa group Niche also played and sang. The National Concert was also played in Bucaramanga, Medellin, and Quibdó (where Juanes performed), Cali and Barranquilla, amongst others.
